Counselor's Corner - Empathetic Children Want to Make a Difference

The awareness that something is not right is what activates empathy in children and encourages them to be Changemakers to make the world a better place. Every child has the potential to become a Changemaker with the right combination of parenting and experiences. However, there are three barriers to becoming a Changemaker. First, most kids admire celebrities and fame, which places the emphasis on self rather than a concern for others. Second, kids are more focused than ever on their possessions, appearance and consumption that it is leading to a "me" before "we" type of thinking. Third, the Tiger Parent type of parenting style where children are being over helped by the adults in their life has caused them to care less about others and be less self-reliant. So, how do we build a Changemaking mindset?

Step 1: Teach the growth mind-set model. Tell your child that empathy muscles can be increased with practice. **Step 2: Emphasize effort not the end product.** "You are getting so much better at your multiplication" instead of their achievement. **Step 3: Encourage practice.** Children who view themselves as helpful are more likely to help in the future, so provide ways for your kids to be helpful. **Step 4: Recap the impact.** After your child has been helpful, discuss the experience.

Another way to help encourage a Changemaking mindset is one that we practice during counseling lessons using the **FACE** acronym. **F**=feelings: read the person's feelings. **A**=Analyze: what is the problem? **C**=care: offer to help the person. **E**=empathize: let them know you care. One way parents can help is the use of service projects. If you and your child can find a cause that stirs your child's heart and plan a way to help, this encourages children to become Changemakers.

Here are some other ideas to encourage a young person to become a Changemaker.

Start with one. Help your child realize that they can make a difference by helping on individual. **Use the news.** Help your child become aware of world concerns and that problems are everywhere. **Prepare kids for dissention.** Teach your children to be Upstanders for their views and not to waver even if someone tries to change their mind. **Share stories of Changemakers.** When kids see other kids standing up and making a difference, they often want to help. **Use positive social media.** Use social media to spread kindness. This is especially good for those that are shy, because they can do it anonymously. **Watch for desensitization.** It is very important for Changemakers to learn ways to take care of themselves, especially when they are exposed to tough issues. **Stretch boundaries.** Expand your child's comfort zone beyond their typical experiencing with visits to those in need such as elderly, homeless, etc.
